

The Moving Field Guide is an outdoor experience that integrates movement, storytelling, sensory and observation experiences, and environmental literacy, giving people across generations the opportunity to gain a deeper understanding of—and connection to—the natural world. Conceived by Dance Exchange Executive Artistic Director Cassie Meador, Moving Field Guides move participants along a path of recognition, appreciation, and ultimately stewardship of and advocacy for the environment.

Dance Exchange's Moving Field Guide Training for Teachers supports educators in building tools and strategies for kinesthetic approaches to environmental education in their classrooms, schoolyards, and communities. Through customizable sessions developed in collaboration with partner schools, school districts, nature centers, and other educational organizations, teachers have opportunities to experience a Moving Field Guide in action, to try new facilitation tools, to integrate new strategies into existing lesson plans and curricula, and to build community with other educators.





# **Moving Field Guide Teacher Training Case Study**

#### Prince George's County Public Schools


Since 2017, Dance Exchange has partnered with Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) in Maryland to develop a hands-on, interactive Teacher Training Program that leads educators through implementing and integrating Moving Field Guide into their lesson plans and

into their district's Growing Up Green environmental education curriculum.

With support from the Chesapeake Bay Trust, Dance Exchange has developed a strategy for connecting Moving Field Guide's kinesthetic learning approaches with the PGCPS Growing Up Green curriculum and the Meaningful Watershed Education Experience, a learner-centered framework used nationwide. This spotlight shares an overview of the 2021-22 Teacher Training series and its impact on educator skills and capacities as well as on learning outcomes for Kindergarten students in the participating schools.



## 14 teachers from 7 schools across Maryland completed the training





An additional 6 physical education teachers joined for select sessions to enhance collaboration and integration of Moving Field Guide tools and practices within schools.

#### **Training Overview**

Module 1: Introducing Arts Integration & Environmental Literacy

Module 2: Building Dances by Observing Nature

Module 3: Practicing and Applying to Our Classrooms

Module 4: Lesson Planning with Kinesthetic Approaches

Module 5: Expanding Your Creative Toolkit & Integrating into Existing Curricular Frameworks

Between training sessions, educators explored Moving Field Guide approaches in their classrooms and shared successes, challenges, and discoveries during reflection sessions and via surveys.

In addition to delivering training, Dance Exchange also partnered with Prince George's County Public Schools to develop and design three model lesson plans integrating Moving Field Guide and Growing Up Green.


